

The whole church hears the sermon — *in their own language.*

If someone sent you this, you probably asked them about the translation you saw at a church service — captions on a screen, or people following preaching in a language they don't speak. This is what that was, how it works, and how to set it up at your own church.

WHAT IT IS

VoxLive puts live captions and spoken translation of the service on each listener's phone — in the language they pick, out of 60. There is no app to install and no account to create for listeners, and no equipment for the church: no transmitters, no receivers, no headsets to hand out. People use the phone already in their pocket.

WHAT A LISTENER DOES

01

Scan the QR at the door

Or open the link the church shares. It's just a web page.

02

Pick a language

Captions on screen, or a spoken translation in their earbuds.

03

Follow the whole service

Scripture appears automatically as it's cited — in that language's own Bible translation.

In most multilingual churches, nine out of ten people understand the preaching. This is for the handful who don't — the visiting family, the in-laws, the newcomer. A church can't grow past the languages it preaches in.

IF YOU HAVE INTERPRETERS

VoxLive doesn't replace them. It carries your interpreter's live voice to every phone — in the room and at home — and covers the languages nobody on your team speaks.

From the pulpit microphone — *to every phone.*

No new hardware. The whole system is a web page at the sound board and the phones your congregation already owns.

1

One device at the sound board.

A laptop, tablet, or phone opens the VoxLive studio in a normal web browser — nothing to install. It listens to the service through its microphone or your sound board.

Already livestreaming to YouTube or Facebook? Connect that stream to VoxLive once instead — captions start when your stream starts and stop when it ends, and nobody touches anything on the day.

2

It translates as the preacher speaks.

Live captions arrive word by word in any of 60 languages, and a natural spoken voice carries the translation for the languages your plan includes. Anyone who joins late sees everything said so far, already there.

When the preacher cites Scripture, the verse appears on every listener's screen automatically — Reina-Valera 1960 for Spanish, the Synodal translation for Russian, and so on. Included on every plan.

3

Everyone follows their own way.

Each phone picks its own language from one shared link. And every screen in the building can carry captions too — the projector behind the stage, the lobby TV, or a subtitle line over your livestream. Each screen gets its own link, language, and look; it works with ProPresenter, OBS, or any browser.

About fifteen minutes, *start to captions.*

1

Create the account.

Free, no card – it asks for your church’s name and the languages of your congregation.

2

Pick where the sound comes from.

In the studio, start with the device’s own microphone placed near the speakers – that works. When you’re ready, connect your sound board, or connect your existing livestream so it runs itself.

3

Go live, then test it like a listener.

Press go live, open your listener link on your own phone, pick a language, and watch the captions arrive. If it works once, it works on the day.

4

Share the link.

The Share tab makes the QR flyers, slides, and door-stand posters for you. The Screens tab puts captions on the projector or lobby TV if you want the whole room covered.

WHAT IT COSTS

Start free, no card. The free plan carries live audio to 25 listeners for 8 hours a month, plus one-time trials of the AI features: 2 hours of live captions and 60 minutes of one spoken language – enough to test at a real service.

\$5 First Sunday. One pass opens the full product for one whole service. If it doesn’t work in your room, the \$5 comes back.

Plans from \$59/month, all-inclusive. No per-language fees, no overage – the price on the page is the whole bill.
